## **Concheck checks off first** win at Winthrop as Eagles defeat Youngstown State

Winthrop's 18 goals were the most the Eagles have scored this season

After four losses away from home to start the season, the Winthrop women's lacrosse team returned to Rock Hill to earn its first win of the season.

"I'm really excited for the team," Winthrop head coach Kara Concheck said following her team's victory over Youngstown State on March 8.

"They've been working really, really hard. They continue to improve, and so I'm just really proud of them

a great job possessing the ball, and that can be reflected upon the fact that we put 18 goals in the back of the net. We did much better on the draws today and really controlling the tempo of the game in that regard," Concheck said.

Pacing Winthrop's scoring was redshirt sophomore Alyssa Angelo, who recorded the first two goals of the match and ended with five total – four of which were unassisted.

"Alyssa is one of the most intense competitors on the field,"

As of March 8 following Winthrop's win over Youngstown State, Angelo ranked top-100 in the country in total goals scored this season (15) and top-50 in goals scored per game (3.00).

Winthrop's Ellie Dutton scored four goals of her own against the Penguins, along with three from Savanah Paton and three from Molly Dankowski. Krystal Beebe, Grayson McKenzie and Claire Witmer also recorded goals.

### York County Council approves proposal to continue Panthers stadium construction

Proposal would have Panthers pay to continue construction then later reimbursed with tax credits

The York County Council approved a proposal that would continue construction on the Carolina Panthers' stalled practice

Panthers pay for the construction of the sports stadium and surrounding infrastructure in exchange for the city granting them tax credits in the future.

"The Panthers will pay for all the infra-

structure going in –

that's your water lines,

to basically reimburse them for them putting in public infrastructure," York County Councilman Bump Roddey told WBTV.

"York County – we've done all that we can do

earning their first team win."

Outscoring the Penguins 18-14, the Eagles not only earned their first win of the season but also Conchecks' first since assuming the head coaching position in mid-January. However, Concheck wanted to be sure the focus remained on the team.

"It's not about me. it's about the team, and that's how it always will be," she said.

Concheck said. "She spreads just fire and passion among the team, and really, not only builds confidence in her teammates, but she just sets the standard.
